## Next year's emphases

The most noticeable scheduled improvement efforts for 2019-20 in grades K5-4 will be in the following areas:

## 1. Mentoring Ministry to Continue

After the success of this year, we look forward to continuing the mentoring mom ministry with hopes of including more moms.

## 2. In-Class Co-Teacher Training

We continue to looks for ways that will help co-teachers keep in touch with the classroom environment, including continuing in-class co-teacher trainings.

## 3. New Co-Teacher Training

Administration looks to add new co-teacher training opportunities during the 2019-20 school year around drop-off and pick-up times.

## 4. Days of Creation Study

Grades 1 and 2 science classes continue in their days of creation study, but teachers look to tweak and compile the 2 current curriculums over summer. This will allow students to study all 7 days of creation in one school year.

# Middle grades (5<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup>)

## **Celebrations**

## This is the second year of students taking the National Latin Exam

Last year, in addition to earning high school credit, 100% of the eighth grade Latin students earned honors on their National Latin Tests. Two received maxima cum laude honors.

## Next year's emphases

The most noticeable scheduled improvement efforts for 2019-20 in grades 5-8 will be in the following areas:

#### 1. Addition of clearer structure

The areas of academic content, approaches, assignments, and assessments will become more structured, based upon more unified middle grades aims, methods, and tools.

## 2. Academic development and oversight procedural change

To divide the workload of developing and clarifying the core subjects in grades 5-8, lead teachers will be appointed for the coming year. This will help ensure that appropriate steps for structure are effectively planned and executed.

#### 3. Greater clarification

Providing greater clarification for the roles and expectations for all involved parties.

## 4. Defined skills and their progression

The more important areas of growth in the middle grades are the building of strategic skills and the development of logical thinking. While this effort is really an extension of the two above, it is singled out because of its importance as the student enters high school.

## 5. Greater support for junior high students

The junior high years will be examined for ways in which students in grades 7 and 8 can be better supported. This will be especially important for the students in grade 7, to help them become established in the new secondary environment.

## **Notes**

- Middle grades are huge opportunities for learning and skill building!
- We will continue to present students with advanced content and rigor to keep them middle grades students reaching, but the experience should be better because of better structure and clarified parent role assistance.
- We will count on strategic parent involvement to simultaneously help the students to think more critically, to learn new, worthy skills, and to build independence where appropriate.

# **High School**

# **Celebrations**

## 1. Strong SAT scores

While we don't want to focus too much on standardized testing, they are a much-looked-at component of college preparation.

In an examination of scores for last year's Class of 2018, the following were noted for those receiving diplomas at LPA:

Mean (average) 1200

Middle 50% Range 1110 to 1290

Since Lake Pointe requires all who earn a diploma to take the SAT or ACT at least once, these scores represent <u>all</u> of the students earning a diploma.

## 2. Success beyond high school

An announcement from North Greenville University also confirms some of Lake Pointe's college preparation efforts. When the university's athletic department released a list of athletes on the Presidential honor roll, three former LPA students were celebrated, including Emma Shearer, Isaiah Mayhall (soccer) and Austin Duncan (golf). College courses can be challenging enough, but these students demonstrated great academic discipline, in that each earned high marks while giving constant hours to the sport, its practices and games, and the related travel.

## **Next year's emphases**

The most noticeable scheduled improvement efforts for 2019-20 in grades 9-12 will be in the following areas:

## 1. Review of English curriculum

Every summer, the academy chooses a curriculum area for review and clarity. Last year, math curriculum was examined. This year, English will be reviewed for reading, composition, grammar, etc..

#### 2. Math practices

For the past couple of years, math teachers have been discussing how to better unify practices in grades 9-12, including appropriate ratio of calculator use to personal computation (using the mind) through the grades, the need to show student work, partial credit allowances, etc. Unified standards and progression will be sought in these and other areas.

## 3. Integrated standardized test practice

A practice we have discussed for some time is to integrate SAT/ACT-style questions on high school assessments in the various courses. We will pursue this idea for next year, using SAT-prep materials. For example, the concept of choose the best answer is a good test of student understanding and logic, hallmarks of classical education.

#### 4. College credit courses

For two years, we have been meeting with representatives from area colleges and even distance learning college programs, from North Greenville and Columbia International to Winthrop. We seek long-term relationships for college-credit earning courses for select subjects in grades 11 and 12. This effort will continue this spring and summer

# **Student Life**

## **Celebrations**

## 1. Morning Gathering

Our daily morning gatherings have been successful in two ways this year. First, there has been a higher proportion of the student body present for morning gatherings. Second, we have made the jump to allowing students to lead gatherings, adding a diversity of voices.

#### 2. Student Life Structure:

We have organized our talks and activities around the "Seven Loves of Student Life." Throughout the year, we have emphasized through practice and teaching the need for authentic faith, spiritual disciplines, others first, meaningful friendships, wisdom, respecting authority, and virtue.

## 3. Student Service Council

We have added to the structure of student service council this year which now focuses on planning, team building, and doing ministry together.

## 4. Winter Retreat (rain or shine)

We had a successful Winter Retreat even though the weather was rainy. Approximately eighty students attended. Our guest speaker, Nathan Chapman, taught our students to view life through the metanarrative of Scripture.

## 5. General acknowledgment:

When events and/or situations were put in front of our students to serve those outside of the LPA community, they responded more mature than their years. There is a general hunger and desire among LPA students to serve those who are in need.

## Next year's emphases

The most noticeable improvement efforts for 2019-20 student life year:

## 1. Missional Emphasis:

Next year and beyond, student life staff look to build a missional emphasis into student life. This will be accomplished in multiple ways over time. Next year, we hope to organize an international mission trip set for Spring break. We are currently in contact with Clubhouse ministries (the group we partner with to do Guatemala Christmas) to potentially organize a trip through them.

## 2. Discipleship Focus

Lake Pointe staff continue to long to learn better what Jesus meant by "go and make disciples". With LPA's mission statement beginning with "To partner with parents to lead students into a growing relationship with Jesus Christ", the academy is here to be apart of Jesus' great commission.
